Rick Van Acker, Professor Emeritus, University of Illinois, Chicago—“The Challenge of Serving Students with EBD in the General Education Setting: What Skills Do General Education Teachers Need?”

The majority of students with emotional and behavioral disorders receive the bulk of their education within the general education classroom. Unfortunately, most general education teachers are ill-prepared to address the significant social and emotional needs of these students. As a result, many of these students are not being provided the level of instruction and/or the opportunity to practice alternative behavioral practices as these teachers often simply avoid situations that could trigger undesired behavior. This workshop will explore this phenomenon and identify some low and moderate demand strategies that teachers can use to better address the needs of these students and to effectively address challenging behavior. This workshop would be appropriate for both general education teachers and special education teachers with whom they collaborate.

Sheldon Braaten, Ph.D., Executive Director, Behavioral Institute, Minneapolis, Minnesota, "Points On Giving Points"

Is your point/token economy system working? These incentive systems are widely used in educational and other settings with nearly all categories of students from those who are struggling to the gifted. However many are ineffective or poorly planned. This presentation will provide a practical description of how to integrate fundamental principles of learning and real world economics in the development and management of useful point systems.

Elizabeth Hardman, Northcentral University, College of Education— "Conducting a Pre-Mod Analysis"

The results of Functional Behavioral Assessments are limited in application because they do not account for the effects emotional disturbance or distorted cognition may have on disordered behavior. The presenter will describe Kaplan's Pre-Mod Analysis (1995) and explain how it may be used to assess the emotional and cognitive concomitants of EBD.

Jan Gont, Diagnostic Teacher, and Jennifer Tate, Behavior Specialist, KCSEC— "Changing the Classroom Structure to Enhance Student Success"

This workshop will explore ways to design the classroom environment, set up behavioral management systems and routines, as well as to organize a classroom culture to maximize consistency and engagement during the school day. Strategies presented can be applied to general education and special education environments.

Cathy Jo Littleton-Wahl, Supervisor, Student Teachers, Illinois College— "Eliminating Trash Talk in the Classroom"

This session will provide an array of effective communication strategies that build confidence in Students and Reduce Defiance.

Neal Takiff and Jenni Hansen, Attorneys at Law— "The Latest Legal Developments in Discipline and Bullying"

Come to this annual ever popular session to learn about court cases that are impacting students with emotional/behavioral disorders.

Bern Beckwith, Psy. D. Clinical Psychologist, Rosalind Franklin University Health System— "Depression and Suicide in Young People"

This program will cover the clinical presentation of depression in young people, core factors associated with children and teens developing depression, how depression affects children socially and academically, and how we can help students with depression as care providers. In addition, this program will discuss how suicide risk is associated with depression and other risk factors in young people, and preventative measures against suicide will be discussed.

Elizabeth Hardman, Northcentral University, College of Education— "Punishment: The Skeleton in Our Closet"

Inappropriate behavior, noncompliance, and conflict can occur in even the most positive, well-managed classroom. This presentation will discuss when it is appropriate to use punishment, the types of punishment teachers may use, and how to use punishment effectively.

"Reflections on Relationships and Student Behavior"

Children and youth present adults with a wide variety of behavioral challenges that are commonly regarded as problems "within" the youth. A different view is what adults do that causes or contributes problem behaviors. This presentation will focus on adults' relationships with students and the significant and often long lasting impact—positive and negative—of their behaviors, on prosocial development.

Woody Johnson, Ed.D. Associate Professor, Northern Illinois University— "Using Functional Behavior Assessment Information to Select and teach Coping and Self-Management Skills to Students with Emotional and Behavioral Disorders"

Instruction in coping and self-management strategies have been demonstrated as effective interventions for children and youth with anxiety and other internalizing disorders. This sessions will provide a series of steps for practitioners to use when developing function-based self-management programs.

Bev Johns, Professional Fellow—MacMurray College, Jacksonville-- "Being an Informed and Compassionate Trauma Educator—Effective Practices when Working with Children who Have Suffered Trauma"

An increasing number of students who have suffered some type of trauma are coming into today's schools. Children who have been abused, who have witnessed abuse, who are victims of human trafficking, have suffered a trauma. What do we as educators need to know about the implications of that trauma and how we can help our students will be the focus of this session.

Mickie Wong-Lo, Associate Professor, Northeastern Illinois University— "Cyberbullying: Examining the Transformation of Bullying to Digital Aggression"

The effects of this digital form of peer aggression can be as detrimental as face-to-face bullying. This session examines the transformation of bullying among our digital generation and strategies towards becoming an Upstander for all children impacted by bullying/ cyberbullying.

Dr. Patricia Kubistal, Retired Administrator, Chicago Public Schools— "How Students Hack into School System Computer Programs"

This session teaches participants about how students are able to hack into school computer systems and what school personnel can do to prevent this from happening.

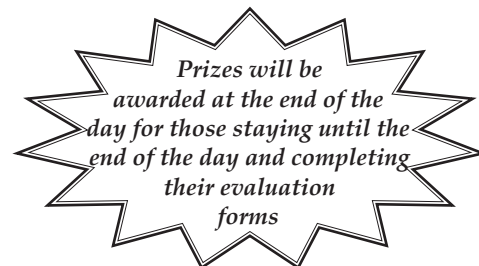
